We lined up our bikes at the starting line on the church parking lot, took some pictures, and then took a walk around the track marked off by orange cones so that we would know the boundaries. When we got back on our bikes, the whistle sounded and we rode around the track for approximately 15 minutes.

Our teachers counted the number of laps that each child rode. Parents, grandparents, other family members, and friends stood around the outside of the track and cheered for us! The children had asked family and friends to support the cause by pledging a certain amount of money per lap or by pledging a flat amount so that a collective donation could be made to Roseland Christian Ministries.

Pastor Joe Huizenga from Roseland was so grateful for the donation of \$2,809 that we were able to raise. He told us that our gift would be such a blessing to many children this summer by giving them the opportunity to spend three days a week in a structured program learning about Jesus, being introduced to hobbies and new skills, and taking day trips to places in the city instead of just hanging out on the streets where violence is such a problem. He talked about our gifts pushing back against that violence. We thank all of our families and friends for helping to do this with their great support!

What fun it was to do something we really enjoy and serve others at the same time. We are so blessed and we are thankful that we can be a blessing too.

PRESCHOOL EMBRYOLOGY STUDY

Do you ever think about the miracle that God performs on a daily basis inside the eggs that chickens lay on the farm? The children at Orland Park Christian Preschool spent a week in April studying about the growth of a baby chick inside an egg. We looked at pictures of the development of the baby chicks from day 1 to day 21 and

we learned what a baby chick has to do to get out of the egg. We even took a field trip to the Children's Farm in Palos Hills to meet real mother hens and see them taking care of the eggs in their nests. After 21 days of counting down and waiting, the preschool children were treated to the hatching of baby chicks in our class incubator. From May 9-12 they were able to observe some live births, freshly-hatched chicks that needed to rest, and the change that occurs in just a few hours from a newborn chick that is wet and wobbly to a fluffy yellow chick that can hop, walk, and jump around

> inside a brooding box. One of the highlights of the children's observations was being able to hold a baby chick in their own hands. They also enjoyed seeing the chicks eat seeds and drink water from a water dish. On May 12, the chicks were ready to be brought to the farm. We thank Vince Kuyvenhoven for delivering the chicks to a local farm where they could have a good home.
